

## About the YATP

The **Youth Apprenticeship Training Program** is a state-approved program that allows select students under 18 to work in facilities alongside skilled craftsmen, including millwrights and electricians.

## Who's involved

The Portland Workforce Alliance works with local employers, Benson High School educators and the Oregon Bureau of Labor & Industries to develop and support this program. Current and past participants include Blount Manufacturing, PCC Structurals, Tice Industries, Gunderson LLC and Columbia Wire & Iron.

## Who benefits

**Employers** can choose from among Portland's most motivated young people to develop their future workforce and support their existing employees.

**Students** learn a trade, earn money and can apply their hours to an adult apprenticeship training program if they decide to continue in the field.
